

Invited Speakers

At the time of printing the following invited speakers have been confirmed:

Dr Jonathan Hodgson



is currently Senior Research Fellow at University of Western Australia in the School of Medicine and Pharmacology located at Royal Perth Hospital. During the past 10 years he has published more than 50 peer-reviewed journal articles in the field of nutrition and cardiovascular disease. One of his major research interests is on the potential for grain legumes and their components to benefit features of the metabolic syndrome, including obesity, hypertension, dyslipidaemia and insulin resistance. His recent research has focussed on lupin as a high protein and fibre novel food ingredient with potential to benefit obesity and hypertension.

Professor Anna Arnoldi



is based at the University of Milan, Food Chemistry and Functional Foods in the School of Pharmacy. She has more than 130 international scientific publications covering health promoting components of grain legumes, nutraceuticals for the prevention of cardiovascular disease, toxicological and sensory consequences of the thermal treatments of food and methods for food quality assurance based on mass spectrometry and proteomics. She was the coordinator of two EU research projects: "Optimisation of the Maillard reaction - a way to improve quality and safety of thermally processed food" and "Optimised processes for preparing healthy and added value food ingredients from lupin kernels, the European protein-rich grain legume". Anna is

Vice-president of the European Association on Grain Legumes (AEP), a foundation member of the academic spin-off HPF-Nutraceuticals and is the author of five patents.

Professor Brian Diers



leads a soybean breeding and genetics program in the Crop Sciences Department at the University of Illinois. His research focuses on utilizing exotic germplasm to improve the disease resistance, seed quality, and yield potential. A major contribution of his program has been the mapping and utilization of genes that provide resistance to phytophthora rot, and soybean cyst nematode, soybean aphid, and sclerotinia white mould. He is also part of a team mapping genes from exotic germplasm that increase seed yield. Brian has co-authored over 55 refereed scientific publications and was presented the Young Crop Scientist Award by the Crop Science Society of America in 2001.

Mr Clancy Michael



produces lupin, wheat, canola, barley and sheep with his wife Jan and son Daniel on their 4,700 ha property in the Strawberry Bridge area, west of Mingenew, in the Mid-West agricultural region of Western Australia. Adoption of new technology has had a huge effect on the development of their farming business and made Clancy a leader within the agricultural community. He is the Vice President of the Mingenew Irwin Group (a Western Australian grower group) and a member of the Founding Committee of the Grower Group Alliance (a body that networks for grower groups, research organisations and farmers). He is also a member of consultative and reference groups such as the Australian Wheat Board, the Grains Research & Development Corporation, Pulse WA, the Western Aus-tralia Herbicide Research Initiative and Plant Health Australia.

Dr Soon-Bin Neoh



is a Director of the Soon Soon Group of Companies, an international food and feed ingredients manufacturing business based in Penang, Malaysia. Dr Neoh was trained as a scientist with a BSc and PhD in Chemistry from the University College London and a post doctorate research fellowship from the University of Chicago, USA. Being the Managing Director for Soon Soon Oilmills Sdn Bhd and Seberang Flour Mill Sdn Bhd, he is a very active industrialist and businessman. He has wide business experience in various Asian countries.

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Dr Colin Hughes



is a Royal Society University Research Fellow in systematic botany in the Department of Plant Sciences, University of Oxford. His research focuses on systematics and evolution of plants and embraces both taxonomic monography and phylogenetics, underpinning broader questions about the origins and documentation of biodiversity. He has worked on a diverse set of Neotropical legume genera and more recently embarked on research on *Lupinus* that includes phylogenetic studies, taxonomic research in the Andes, and investigation of the origins of the Andean domesticate *Lupinus mutabilis*.

Dr David Bowran



leads Agricultural Systems Research at the Department of Agriculture and Food, Western Australia and is an Adjunct Professor of Agronomy at the Muresk Institute at Northam. He has widespread experience in research and management with extensive experience weed science and herbicide use in cropping systems, with particular emphasis in crop tolerance to herbicide. He received his PhD from the University of Western Australia for work on the genetic and environmental factors affecting wheat tolerance to chlorsulfuron. David has been a high profile leader in the WA grains industry with a particular focus on strategic planning and analysis.

Dr Mark Sweetingham



has been involved in lupin research since joining the Western Australian Department of Agriculture and Food in 1983. He has specialist expertise in the areas of crop protection, farming systems and genetic improvement with notable publications on integrated management of lupin diseases and more recently he has led research on the feed and food uses of lupins and other grains. He has been involved in projects which have delivered significant industry outcomes through national and international collaboration and led the Grain Legume Program the Centre for Legumes in Mediterranean Agriculture (CLIMA). Mark's role in charting the strategic direction of lupin research to meet the priority needs of Australian industry has been recognised.

Dr Bevan Buirchell



is the Senior Lupin Breeder in the Department of Agriculture and Food, Western Australian. He joined the Department of Agriculture in 1988 working in lupin crop development programme pioneered by John Gladstones and Wallace Cowling. He was successful in domesticating the rough-seed lupins, *L. atlanticus* and *L. pilosus*, through mutation breeding and interspecific crossing. In 1999 he took responsibility for breeding *L. angustifolius* and overall management of lupin genetic improvement and has led the integration marker assisted selection and the use of NIR for quality traits into the breeding program. Bevan has travelled extensively in the lupin world, collecting lupins in their wild habitats in Morocco, Canary Islands and Egypt as well as collaborating with many breeding programs throughout Europe. He has extensive knowledge in

lupin genetic resources and breeding.

Dr Brett Glencross



is the Principal Research Scientist for Aquaculture Nutrition and Environmental Management at the Department of Fisheries, Western Australia. He has a Masters Degrees in Biochemistry from the University of Western Australia and a PhD in Aquaculture Nutrition from the University of Queensland. During past decade he has undertaken research and management of projects examining prawn nutrition, tuna aquaculture, environmental management, grain product development and fish bioenergetics in Australia and with INRA-IFREMER, France. Brett's current projects include the environmentally sustainable development of barramundi farming, management of international aquaculture development projects in Vietnam and Cambodia and

management of a national program coordinating the development and evaluation of grain protein products for the aquaculture feed sector.

Professor John Howieson



is a root nodule bacteria ecologist with a particular interest in the adaptation of rhizobium strains to harsh environments and the selection of new strains for maximum nitrogen fixation. He has also led the discovery of several new pasture and forage legumes for Australian agriculture. John was the Foundation Director of the Centre for Rhizobium Studies at Murdoch University, Western Australia.

Professor Alan Robson Vice-Chancellor of The University of Western Australia.



Prior to his appointment as Vice-Chancellor in 2004, Alan held the positions of Foundation Director of the Cooperative Research Centre for Legumes in Mediterranean Agriculture (CLIMA), Dean of the Faculty of Agriculture, Head of the School of Agriculture, and Professor of Agriculture (Soil Science) at The University of Western Australia. In 2003 Professor Robson was made a Member of the Order of Australia.

Alan Robson has been involved in several Australian and European panels to review agriculture and related education in Australia as well as review panels to evaluate agricultural research in Denmark.

Alan's major research interests are the effect of mineral nutrients and acidity on nodulation and nitrogen fixation by legumes, the role of vesicular mycorrhizae in nutrient uptake by plants and the diagnosis of nutrient disorders in plants. His lecturing period at UWA greatly benefited many agricultural science graduates and post-graduates through his excellent ability to teach and inspire.





Presentation Guidelines

Guidelines for Oral Presentations

Time limits

- Keynote addresses 40 min, (30 min for presentation + 10 min for questions and discussion).
- Oral presentations 20 min (15 min presentation + 5 min for questions)

Media

- Presentations may only be given as PowerPoint presentations.
- Prepare your presentation as a single PowerPoint file to run on an IBM compatible computer.
- All presentations must run on the Windows operating system. Conference computers will run on Windows XP Professional
- PowerPoint presentations must be submitted the day before the presentation.
- Bring one copy of your presentation to the conference on a CD-ROM or USB media storage device. This copy is to be used as a backup by you and the conference organizers if required.
- Conference organizers will load all presentations on conference computers. Presenters will NOT be allowed to use their own laptop computers. MacIntosh computers will NOT be available.
- All presenters will be given the opportunity to check their presentations on-site, before their presentation time.
- Remember your presentation is limited by the time allocated. You will not be able to extend your time if you have technical problems during your talk.

Advice on Production of PowerPoint Graphics

- Keep visual aids simple. Convey only one idea per table, figure, or title slide.
- Slides should be readable to the unaided eye. You will be speaking in a large room. BIG IS BEAUTIFUL and easy to read.
- Use appropriate and compatible colors for type and backgrounds.
- Simple typefaces are preferable to fancy fonts, use Arial or Times New Roman. Bold type may be effective on title slides.
- Images of scenes or organisms should clearly show what you want the audience to see.
- Do all cropping of images in an image processing package, NOT PowerPoint. Save the cropped image as an external file and then insert the image into your presentation. Image resolutions should not be greater than 120 dpi.
- Keep your presentation as simple as possible to avoid hardware and software conflicts. Audio and video files, animated text, animated figures, superscripts, and subscripts cause most problems.

Preparing and Presenting Posters

- Posters will be displayed on a free-standing board. Your poster has been allocated a space 1m wide x 1.2m high.
- Please not exceed the above dimensions. We recommend using velcro to mount material on the panel.
- Posters must include the name(s) and affiliations of the author(s) and preferably a photograph of the presenter to facilitate identification at the Conference.
- In preparing the poster you should not attempt to detail your entire project. Present only enough data to support conclusions or to explain the point(s) you wish to make. And please have a short clear conclusion.
- Data should be kept to a minimum in favour of diagrams and photographs. Aim to put across a simple message in an eye-catching manner.
- All posters must carry the same title as submitted on the poster paper
- All text lettering should be large enough to be legible at a distance of 1.5m. Lettering used for titles should be 24-point size minimum. All text must be in English.
- Photographs and diagrams should be large enough to be read at a distance of 1.5m.
- You will be allocated a poster number.
- Posters should remain on display for the full duration of the Conference.
- Poster presenters are requested to be available at the poster to discuss their work during the poster viewing sessions

Official Language

Option 1: Lupin Field Tour - Wongan Hills


A full day trip into the Western Australian wheatbelt to the picturesque country town of Wongan Hills, approximately 200 km north-east of Perth. This is a major centre for wheat and lupin production. Delegates will visit the Department of Agriculture and Food research farm at Wongan Hills to see current lupin breeding and lupin agronomy research activities and experience local farming practices. On the return journey, enjoy viewing some of the unique local wildflowers and visit the historical town of New Norcia.



Option 2: Lupin Processing and Products Tour - Perth Region

Inspect the world's largest lupin grain handling and de-hulling facilities and Kwinana and Forreestfield. Visit a niche bakery that uses lupin flour in Fremantle. Tour lupin seed chemistry laboratories and aquaculture facilities at Hillarys Boat Harbour.

The tour will give you the opportunity to see the beautiful Indian Ocean coast returning to Fremantle in time to visit a local pub or restaurant for the evening.



Satellite Workshops

- Friday 19th September -

Molecular Marker Development and Implementation in Lupin Breeding

Through hand-on experiments and lectures, this workshop will demonstrate the new methods and strategies on molecular marker development used by the Australian lupin breeding program, by which we have made our lab as the only example of large-scale molecular plant breeding in legume crops except the soybean in North America.

Cost: \$ 120 Numbers:30 max

Aquaculture Feed Grains

Examine the progress in development of feed grain applications in aquaculture feeds, with an emphasis on lupins, but also examining other grains. The workshop will be used to not only review the work undertaken in this area over the past 10 years, but to also further identify limitations to grain use application and define strategies to improve the adoption of feed grains in aquaculture feeds.

Cost: \$ 100 Numbers:35 max

Lupin Alkaloid Analytical Methods

The Chemistry Centre of Western Australia helped pioneer gas chromatography methods to analyse lupin alkaloids. The workshop will give delegates an opportunity to see first hand how lupin samples are prepared, extracted and analysed for alkaloid content. Data will be discussed from a range of lupin species. Other analytical tools for measuring lupin seed components will be discussed.

Cost: \$ 50 Numbers:25 max

Lupin Disease Screening

A one day gathering to visit lupin breeding disease screening nurseries at South Perth and Medina field plots. Talk to local plant pathologists and lupin breeders and observe field and glasshouse screening methodology for a range of diseases including brown spot, CMV and anthracnose. Discuss and share disease screening techniques and improved methodology with Australian and international colleagues.

Cost: \$ 50 Numbers:25 max

Lupins for Food and Health

The workshop will be sponsored by the Centre for Food and Genomic Medicine and conducted at the Western Australian Institute for Medical Research facilities adjacent to Royal Perth Hospital.



Human dietary intervention research involving lupins will be discussed along with new lupin food product examples and opportunities. An update on lupin allergy studies in Australia will also be covered.

Cost: \$ 40 Numbers:40 max

Advances in the Delivery and Management of Lupin Root Nodule Bacteria

The understanding of the ecology and genetics of the root nodule bacteria has increased substantially in the last decade. This workshop will discuss the modern techniques that have allowed us to more fully understand population structure in the lupin bacteria that are colonising our fields and forming nodules, their population structure and their genetics. Advances in inoculation technology will also be discussed. The workshop will be delivered by staff and associates of the Centre for Rhizobium Studies (CRS), Murdoch University, which is celebrating its 10th anniversary in 2007/ 2008 (<http://www.crs.murdoch.edu.au>).

Tissue Culture Workshop

This workshop will include tissue culture methods relating to media and PGRs, micropropagation, ovule and embryo rescue, double haploidy and aspects of genetic transformation.

Lupin Genetic Resources - utilisation and characterisation

This workshop will introduce you to the world lupin genetic resources collection, including the genebanks where the germplasm is stored. In a hands-on computer session we will demonstrate how to characterize collection sites and conduct ecogeographic research and from core collections.


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Welcoming Cocktail Party

Conference Dinner


Tuesday 16th September



River Cruise



Fremantle is located amongst some world-famous travel spots, and some not so well known ones. If you have any spare time here are a few options for you.

Perth City




Perth is located alongside the peaceful waters of the Swan River. 20km inland from Fremantle it was originally located for the safe inland position during colonial times with the river also providing an excellent means for transporting supplies from the coastal port to the fledgling colony. Now Perth City centre bustles with activity, it offers a range of choices for shopping as well as a number of tourist attractions. While visiting the city a number of other attractions are short trips from the CBD itself. Perth Zoo and the Old Mill are both just a short ferry ride from the city. Barracks Arch, Kings Park and Burswood Casino are also located just on the edge of the city centre and are easily accessible by public transport.

Fremantle

Fremantle today retains much of the old charm of its past: its situation at the mouth of the Swan River, its picturesque old buildings, its cultural diversity and the 'Freo feeling' that sets it apart from Perth. It is a working port, with a big fishing fleet as well as container ships and the occasional large cruise vessel.

In a few square kilometres, it would be hard to find a bigger variety of sights, sounds and experiences, all within comfortable walking distance - coffee on the 'Cappucino strip', locally brewed beer, a stroll through the Fremantle Markets on the weekend, local seafood at Fishing Boat Harbour, a training session of the local footy team the Fremantle Dockers.

To experience some of the history and culture several attractions are worth a visit, including the Round House, Fremantle Museum and Arts Centre, Western Australian Maritime Museum, Fremantle Motor Museum, Fremantle Prison, Fishing Boat Harbour. Self-guided walks are established through the Fremantle Trails, a series of trails and walks around Fremantle's central business district designed to take you on a personalised tour of Fremantle using maps, signs, street art and landscaping



Kings Park and Botanic Gardens

A unique bushland, tranquil parkland and botanic garden overlooking the Swan River and Darling Range. Kings Park has a total area of 400.6 hectares and is located approximately 1.5 km from the Central Business District of Perth. It is a popular place for picnics, pleasant walks, cultural and ceremonial events.

Nearly two thirds of the Park is natural bushland containing 319 species of native plants and around 80 bird species. The balance of the Park is made up of superbly cultivated gardens and open recreational areas.

Rottneest Island

A 20 minute boat trip from Fremantle will land you amongst some of the world's finest beaches and bays - a spectacular venue for snorkelling, scuba diving, surfing and swimming. Although September may not provide the best opportunity for taking advantage of these features the island also has some of Australia's oldest colonial streetscapes and architecture, with the indigenous flora and fauna provide the backdrop to a unique holiday experience. Many tours and activities available, including a popular two hour guided tour of the Island






